- 1. All sections must have headings. The headings must be underlined.
- 2. The first section of your presentation is your introduction: Why you chose the project. How you put the project together. Where you got our information.
 - a. Heading: Project Title (i.e. <u>Claymation Introduction</u>)
- 3. The second section is the **body of your presentation**. This section will include your Elizabethan Research. The body must be written out, but you are not required to follow the written portion exactly. It's simply a blueprint. You must include your quoted sources in this section.
 - a. Heading: Elizabethan Research on... (i.e. Elizabethan Research on Clothing)
 - 4. The Conclusion: Your presentation must have a conclusion that wraps up your proposal.
 - a. Heading: Conclusion (i.e. Costume Portfolio Conclusion)
 - 5. For those groups that have a script, it will be placed after Works Cited Page.

Formatting Template

1. Project Introduction (i.e. Claymation Introduction)

This section will be written out in paragraph form. This section will be double spaced throughout.

2. Elizabethan Research (i.e Elizabethan Clothing Research)

This section will be written in paragraph form and double spaced throughout. This section will include all your research. You must cite all the research for both direct quotes and all paraphrasing (Ellison 56).

3. Conclusion Portion (i.e. Costume Portfolio Conclusion)

This section will be written in paragraph form and double spaced.

4. Works Cited Page (i.e. The Heading must be centered: Works Cited Page)

Your sources must be placed in alphabetical order and must be double spaced.
